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Harvest & Bulk Update

The Dog Days of summer have given way to fall, and while there was some uncertainty whether California's hottest summer on record would accelerate the crop or cause vines to shut down and delay harvest, the answer has been resoundingly in favor of acceleration. Across all regions, harvest is in full swing, with whites largely wrapped up and focus now on reds.

In general, the 2024 crop will be smaller than last year's due to extended heat causing lighter yields per acre and acreage removals resulting in fewer bearing acres. Both make it very difficult to gauge how small the overall crop will actually be, but one thing is certain: even though yields are down, not all fruit will be sold due to wineries recalibrating supply to adapt to high inventories, weakening consumer demand, lower risk tolerance, and higher interest rates. This has left many opportunities for buyers for virtually all varieties throughout all regions in California.

The smaller supply and general conservative nature in 2024 could lead some buyers to a more balanced supply position after being long on 2023. Of course, this supply position will be heavily influenced by end-of-year casegood sales as well as first-half of 2025 sales projections.

Following are more specifics on the grape market and harvest by region, and a bulk market update.

North Coast

The North Coast harvest is well underway, with Sauvignon Blanc wrapped up and Chardonnay and Pinot Noir nearly there as well. A crossover in grape maturity led to reds and whites being harvested simultaneously, which has complicated the North Coast harvest. As a result, some buyers who showed late-season interest have not been able to be as opportunistic as they may have liked. There are still a few buyers out looking, and there are many opportunities for them at low prices.

As of now, Sauvignon Blanc across the North Coast was lighter than estimated, which did bring in buyers in for some late-season purchases, Pinot Noir is heavier than estimated, and Chardonnay is heavier in Mendocino County and in excess of demand in Sonoma County. It is still too early to really determine crop size for other red varietals, but if yields come in low enough for buyers, there are still grapes available. The good news for all is that quality reports have been positive throughout the North Coast.

San Joaquin Valley

Most white varieties (and Pinot Noir) have been harvested, and growers are now focused on later-season reds, with the expectation that harvest will wrap up by the second week in October. For the most part, all varieties and regions within the Valley are coming in lighter than average. White varietals are roughly 10% to 15% below average, but some older vineyards that struggled with the heat were down even further. Not only are clusters light, but juice yields have been reportedly light, as well. Most white grapes were harvested, even if it was for concentrate, at a very low price.

It is still early, but it appears that tonnage per acre on red varietals is trending similarly light as whites. Despite the lower yields and reduced acreage base, demand has been slow all season. There have been a few late-season deals for reds, including Petite Sirah and Cabernet Sauvignon, and southern interior Rubired, but the additional tons moved have been minimal. There will be a significant amount of unsold red grapes, and many growers appear to be dropping fruit rather than custom crushing to gamble on the bulk market.

Central Coast

The Central Coast is wrapping up harvest for white varietals and is getting into the thick of harvesting reds. Harvest is likely to finish around the last week of October—possibly sooner depending on the weather.

Yields have been light to extremely light for what has been harvested so far. Growers are reporting that Sauvignon Blanc yields are between 30% to 50% below the five-year average. Pinot Noir is similarly down between 25% to 50%, depending on location, with cooler-weather sites faring better than warmer locations. Pinot Grigio and Chardonnay yields are a bit better but still 25% to 30% off early-season expectations. It is still early for Cabernet Sauvignon, but it could be the most impacted varietal with early picks coming in 40% to 50% lower than early-season projections.

Despite low yields per acre, it is very likely that a number of tons will go unharvested even with some increased activity to supplement lost supply late in the year.

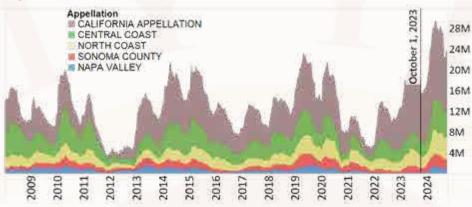
For the greater part of the year, grape sellers had not intended on custom crushing their unsold grapes; however, with a light harvest, there are a moderate number of sellers now reconsidering or changing their decision, especially for reds in the North Coast and Central Coast.

Bulk Market

Bulk gallons actively for sale were on a delayed and slower than normal downward trend starting mid-August, which bottomed out at 22.4 million gallons in early September but recently increased again to 24 million gallons. This added volume is very rare at this time of the year, considering it is not from the new vintage—a continuing sign of challenging retail sales and sellers looking to reduce inventory due to slow consumer sales.

The volumes listed also continue to lean heavily towards reds. Typically, reds actively for sale are around 70% of total availability—they are currently at 80%. As for whites, there are still 4 million gallons available, with the 2024 vintage wines coming to the market soon. Many of these wines, excluding some lots of Chardonnay, will be more difficult to sell as 2024 wines become available, even at very low prices.

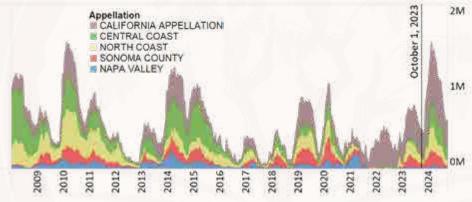
There are still nearly 17 million gallons of 2023 vintage wine available, in addition to the nearly 5.3 million gallons of 2022 available. This is a significant volume that will be carried over with the new vintage beginning to be listed on the market and continues the trend of wines staying on the market longer.

Sauvignon Blanc & Pinot Grigio

- Based upon the lighter yields per acre, the bulk market is likely to be more active for 2024 vintage Sauvignon Blanc and Pinot Grigio than it was for 2023. Our early conversations with sellers confirm fewer of them are projecting to have bulk wine to sell and fewer gallons will be offered for sale.

Figure 2 - Sauvignon Blanc Bulk Gallons Available



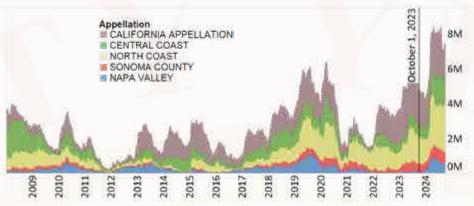

Cabernet Sauvignon

for sale have hovered around 550,000 gallons since July, and demand remains generally soft. Most of the volume actively for sale is now V23. More sellers have indicated a willingness to accept prices near \$20 or lower, but this has not yet spurred additional interest. As harvest ends and we move into 2025, the market will likely get more active for V23.

Figure 3 - Cabernet Sauvignon Bulk Gallons Available



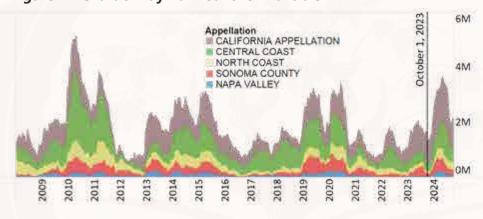

- There continues to be downward pressure on asking prices for Sonoma County Cabernet Sauvignon, and some sellers are now willing to accept single-digit offers. Despite the lower prices, buyers have not yet shown any interest in the opportunity.
- Buyers of North Coast Cabernet Sauvignon have only shown minimal interest for lots competitively priced with California Appellation. There are now 2.8M gallons available of V22 and V23 wines, many of which are growerowned.
- Demand is focused on V23 for Paso Robles Cabernet Sauvignon, but buyers remain reluctant to secure V23 supply as of yet. With the Paso Robles Cabernet Sauvignon crop appearing to be very light, bulk demand could strengthen.
- There were a few opportunistic buyers of California Appellation Cabernet Sauvignon which reduced available volumes, but with 2M gallons still actively for sale, there are more opportunities to be had.

Chardonnay

- Lighter yields per acre will mean fewer lots and smaller volumes of V24 for sale.
- Volumes actively for sale statewide are not historically high, but they are a bit elevated when compared to averages over the last decade, particularly for Central Coast and California.
- With buyers in harvest-mode and without urgent needs for V23 lots, the market for Chardonnay has been generally

Figure 4 - Chardonnay Bulk Gallons Available



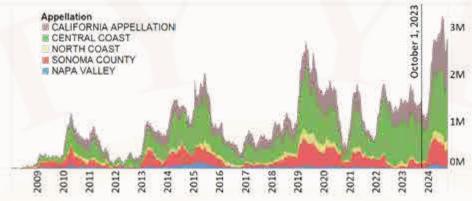

stagnant statewide. We expect buyers to regain some interest in the remaining V23 and V24 lots when they come to the market.

Pinot Noir

- Supply statewide is at 2.8
 million gallons—this is
 significantly more than has ever
 been listed at this time of the
 year. Last year, just 1.4 million
 gallons were listed at this time.
 A significant percentage of this
 supply is California Appellation.
- Demand for Pinot Noir remains quite low. There has been some limited activity since the last newsletter for Russian River Valley lots between \$10 to \$12

per gallon, but deals throughout the rest of the state have been sub-\$5 per gallon.

Conclusion

As we come up on the end of harvest, there are still many opportunities for buyers, and growers with unsold fruit are willing to listen to any and all offers. Despite the late-season interest from opportunistic grape buyers, there will be significant unsold tonnage this year, even for well-managed vineyards.

2024 has been a correction year, and corrections are rarely comfortable, but there is promise on the horizon. Acreage removals will limit the structural crop potential moving forward, and the smaller yields per acre in 2024 will only help return bulk wine and grape markets to balance. But until consumer sales stabilize, the industry will continue to chase downward demand with removals. These corrections could lead to some buyers returning to their normal side of the market next year, but there is still work to be done.
